Recent Sightings

with Mark Reeder
For the period Nov-Dec 2018

Bittern

The regular wintering bird was seen at Pit-house West on the 9th and 30th December.

Little Egret

A single bird frequented RVCP during the period and into the New Year. One was at Thrybergh C.P on the 9th November.

Great White Egret

Two birds were found at Pebley Pond on 1st November, where they remained (apart from a brief visit to Queens Park Chesterfield on the 3rd) until the 4th.

Bewick's Swan

On 9th December, a party of 7 adults were seen to leave Langsett Reservoir,

subsequently paying a brief visit to nearby Underbank Res', before heading southeast at dusk.

Whooper Swan

At Thrybergh C.P on the 19th November 21 were present between 08:00 and 10:50, with 8 departing at 09:40 followed

by the remaining birds an hour later. A further 4 were at Thrybergh C.P on the 24th, with 2 north through Orgreave on the 27th. On the 9th December 4 were at Orgreave until 09:20 and another 9 were nearby at Treeton Dyke, these latter birds being seen heading southwest over Pit-house West at 15:40.

Pink-footed Goose

On the 17th November skeins of 180 and 120 were seen heading north over Midhope at 10:45 and 10:55 and 130 (possibly the latter flock) were seen heading north west over the Shirebrook Valley at 10:30. On the 24th 150 went northeast over Heeley City Farm. The following day 100 were seen going northwest over Barlow Common, with 140 heading east over Middleton Moor then Baslow late afternoon.

Typically during December movements increased with total counts (allowing for duplication) through the area of: 940 east on the 9th, 370 west/northwest on the 11th, 470 mostly northwest on Christmas Eve, 55 east at Thrybergh on the 29th and lastly 132 over Fulwood on the 30th.

Mandarin

A maximum of 113 were at Agden Res' on the 10th November.

Wigeon

Peak counts of 203 and 351 at RVCP on the 15th November and 13th December respectively.

Gadwall

A total of 104 were at Catcliffe Flash on the 21st November.

Red-crested Pochard

A single female was present at RVCP throughout the period. Two drakes and a female were at Treeton Dyke on the 14th December.

Smew

A drake and two equally socially awkward red-heads were found at RVCP from the 29th December until the year end. Choosing to spend their time apart with single red-heads on the Fishing Lake and Intermediate Lake (Scree Pond), whilst the drake spent his time on Meadowgate Lake.

Red-breasted Merganser

At Stocksbridge 2 flew east on the 11th November, with a single briefly at Thrybergh C.P the following day. These represent the only records in our area this year!

Red Kite

Just one record during the period at Redmires on the 13th November.

Golden Plover

Peak gatherings of 300+ at Onesmoor on the 11th November and 200+ at Peat Pits on the 16th December.

Jack Snipe

There were reports of singles from; Woodhouse Washlands (19th Nov), Kiveton Community Woodland (23rd Nov), Silverwood Lagoon (4th Dec) and Aldwarke and Blackburn Meadows on the 9th. Two were at Blackburn Meadows on the 27th.

Little Gull

An unseasonal 1st winter was briefly at Orgreave on the 17th November.

Yellow-legged Gull

At Attercliffe 2 adults were at Warren Street on the 5th November. Four were present at Middleton Moor on the 8th and 18th, with 2 there on 11th and 15th. During December 2 were at Middleton Moor on the 1st with 3 there the following day. At Orgreave 2 (adult and 3rd year) were in the pre-roost on Christmas Day, with 2 fininshing the year off on the 31st.

Caspian Gull

During November, an adult was in the Attercliffe area between the 20th and 25th. What was presumably the same bird was seen again at Stevenson Road on the 2nd December. On the 6th December, an impressive 6 (2ads 3cy

2cy 2x1cy) at Poolsbrook were reported. A different adult was seen at Stevenson Road on 19th and a single adult was at Poolsbrook on the 27th.

Waxwing

A smattering of birds began to appear in the area from late December with the first at Ecclesall on the 19th. At Heeley 8 were seen on Christmas Eve, with 4 over there on the 24th and 7 at the junction of Richard's and Ann's Road on the 30th. A single at Malin Bridge on 25th remained until the following day when 2 were also seen on Shoreham Street. The final report of the year was of 2 at Bolsover on 30th which were still present the following day.

Cetti's Warbler

A single record of one calling at Pithouse West on the 9th December.

Bearded Tit

Two were at Markham Vale North Tip on 12th Nov.

Brambling

An excellent winter for this species with large flocks recorded at; Longshaw – 200+ 11th Nov, Stanage Plantation - 500+ 18th Nov, Sugworth – 100 4th Dec, Longshaw – 150+ 26th Dec' and Ramsley Moor 26th Dec.

Twite

A single was heard calling at Middleton Moor on the 11th Nov'.

Mealy Redpoll

Up to 4 were present at Orgreave during November, with at least one remaining through December.

Arctic Redpoll

A 1st winter Coues Arctic Redpoll was found at Orgreave on 3rd November and remained until the 24th, though it's identification was not confirmed until the 18th. This is the first record in our area since the famous 'invasion' during the winter of 95/96.

Crossbill

Reported at ten sites during the period. Large flocks were reported from several localities during November with; 50 Hollingdale 3rd, 70 Thornseat Delf 17th and 30 at Broomhead Res' on the 18th. Highest counts in December came from Langsett Res' 31 on 17th and Broomhead Res' with 30on the 28th.

Hawfinch

Singles (possibly the same) were seen during November at Agden Side (10th) and Low Bradfield (26th).

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
SBSG WILLOW TIT SURVEY - 2019



Wednesday January 9th Stuart Davies Spring in Michigan

Stuart has been a member of the SBSG since the early 1970's, certainly 40 years. He has always been interested in Natural History and started serious bird watching about the same time, after joining the R.S.P.B., when he was at a loose end after graduation. In later life he started going overseas birding and acquired the necessary camera gear to record his sightings. He has always had a camera, but not long focus lenses suitable for the job.

Since retirement from the N.H.S. in 2008 he has become a volunteer with the P.D.N.P. ranger service and has worked a lot in the Upper Derwent Valley, also doing wildlife surveys with the Eastern Moors partnership (Spring migrants and Dragonflies).

One of his last overseas trips was with a group to the Great Lakes of the USA, mainly to the spring migration hot spot of Magee Marsh, on the shores of lake Erie. He spent a week in and around the reserve and adjacent areas, plenty of migrant warblers and other birds on show, but has never been to such a busy place when birding in the USA. His visit coincided with their so called Big Week when it seems every birder in the USA goes there. After that he moved up in to Michigan to the shores of L. Huron and also to explore the wooded areas for the endangered Kirklands Warbler in its protected habitat.

Wednesday 13th February Keith Clarkson - Iceland Land of birds, fire and water

Keith Clarkson

"I am a passionate birder. I was brought up in Sheffield with the Peak District as my playground. Here I got into birding and ringing at an early age, becoming an active member of the Sheffield Bird Study Group since its founding years. I went to Sheffield University to study Zoology. Whilst undertaking my PhD on the behavioural ecology of the Magpie, I was lucky enough to work on seabirds with Prof. Tim Birkhead in both the Canadian High



and Low Arctic, Yellow-billed magpies in California and Zebra Finches in Australia before settling down to spend many years working for Sheffield City Museum and the Peak District National Park Authority where I was the Assistant National Park Officer. After which I achieved my lifelong ambition, of joining the RSPB, in the role of Public Affairs Manager for North West England. Since when, my career has successfully spiralled downwards. Prior to my retirement in 2017 I was the Senior (old) Site Manager, responsible for the RSPB's Bempton Cliffs and Coquet Island nature reserves - my dream job! Now having retired I am leading wildlife tours for Naturetrek to Iceland and Yorkshire and the Caribbean with 'Birding the Islands'. Throughout, I have been passionate about bird migration and have spent a lifetime studying visible migration both through the Southern Pennines and now on the East Coast of Yorkshire. I am an active member of the RSPB, BTO and both Flamborough and Filey Bird Observatories, but I keep my feet on the ground by following The Owls - Sheffield Wednesday!"



Situated on the edge of the Arctic Circle on the Mid-Atlantic ridge, where America meets Europe, Iceland's turbulent geological history has created a stunning wilderness where wildlife still abounds. In 2018 I was lucky enough to make three separate visits to Iceland, in March, June and July, a rare chance to cover large areas of the country at different stages in the breeding season. This talk will introduce you to the wonderful birds, wildlife and landscapes of Iceland, capturing their arrival, breeding and the start of their departure to wintering grounds in the the UK and further south. Areas featured include the Iceberg lake Jökusárlon.

Raptor Persecution in the Peak District

In the Summer me and my 13-year son Theo enjoyed a modest tally of Peak District encounters with birds of prey – buzzards soaring below Bamford Edge, a Hen Harrier on Totley Moor, more Kestrels than you could shake a stick at and the pair of Peregrines hanging out at Kinder Downfall. All special.

After RSPB's Mark Thomas and his colleagues' talk to the Bird Study Group in November – 'Raptor Persecution in the Peak District' I had to do something and contacted National Trust, Peak District National Park Authority (PDNPA) and Severn Trent Water. I asked, "As someone who enjoys accessing the Peak District, can you tell me how you are responding to the evidence that RSPB has gathered, that shows raptor persecution associated with land managed for driven grouse shooting, in particular in the Dark Peak?" To date I've heard back from National Trust and PDNPA. I've shared all the responses with SBSG. I think my query to Severn Trent has got lost in the burst water pipes backlog!

Rhodri Thomas at PDNPA says "We will be holding a meeting early in the New Year to discuss whether we continue with the Bird of Prey Initiative. Whether or not we continue I think we will need to consider other approaches to tackling the problem of bird of prey persecution." He has invited talking with SBSG about the issue. Also, I've noted in some recent posts that the Bird of Prey Initiative has attracted criticism from some raptor persecution groups in respect of one of the partner's position. Please read the responses received and if you have any observations or recommendations please share them.

Local Field trips

Derwentdale - Raptor Watch 8.30am - March date TBC

This site, known locally by South Yorkshire and North Derbyshire birders as Windy Corner, is on the road up Derwentdale, around two hundred yards north of the dam wall of Howden reservoir. There is limited roadside parking back towards the dam wall. The prevailing westerly winds mean that soaring raptors favour the hillsides of Cow Hey, Nether Hey and Howden Clough on the east side of the reservoir, and the spot also has good views north towards Ox Hey and Slippery Stones, and over the conifer plantations south towards Hollin Clough.

The main target is Goshawk, but there is a good chance of seeing other raptors, as well as Raven, the woodlands should have siskin and maybe crossbill, recent years have been good for whooper swan on more than one occasion, and it is probably one of the best places in the area to see mountain hare.

Meet at 8.30am on Saturday (date TBC) and bring warm clothing and a flask. The meeting normally breaks up by 11.00.
