

SBSG e-Newsletter November 2016

Recent Highlights (Sept - Oct 2016)

September

A juvenile Black-necked Grebe was at Thrybergh C.P on the (remaining until the 9th). Yellowlegged Gulls were reported at Redmires and Middleton Moor on 4th, whilst the Shag remained at Linacre and at least one Marsh Harrier continued to be seen in the Agden area. On the 6th 72 Common Scoter flew northwest over Catcliffe Flash. Wandering post breeding Egrets were well represented on the 7th with four at Orgreave and five at Thrybergh. A report of a juvenile Black Redstart at West Street on the 7th was intriguing.



Candidate for bird of the year was a juvenile Pallid Harrier in the Big Moor area. First seen on the 9th and identified from photographs. For a fortunate few it was still present the following day, though mostly distantly. It appeared again briefly the following morning when it showed well to a before vanishing. small group Presumably it had roosted nearby and continued on its journey post roost. At least one Osprey over Big Moor provided some consolation for those searching for the Harrier.

Keeping the raptor theme, creamcrowned Marsh Harriers were at Orgreave and Firsby early morning on the 13th, with another at Redmires on 16th. An Osprey went south at the latter site that day with another over Arbourthorne.

On the 17th the first skeins of Pinkfooted Geese were reported over Middleton Moor, Orgreave and Stocksbridge. Another Osprey Barbrook on the 18th and more evidence of wildfowl movement with two Pintail at Redmires, followed by a further five at Langsett on the 20th.

Observers watching two **Dippers** on the Don at Attercliffe were lucky enough to see a Red Kite as it headed northeast on the 26th.

October

The first of several Whooper Swan records received during the period was of two adults at Redmires briefly on the 2nd October the same day as a small movement of Pink-footed Geese with small skeins over Aldwarke, Blackburn Meadows and Fulwood. A brief Garganey (probably a juvenile) was at Thrybergh C.P on the 3rd. Red Kites were over Brecks and Norwood Allotments (possibly 2) on the 4th with another over Dore on the 6th. Also on the 6th five Pintail circled Orgreave before leaving south. On the 7th the Redmires gull roost held two Yellow-legged and a single 1st winter Caspian Gull, with three of the former species and presumably the same 1st winter Caspian the following evening. An excellent record of four Common Cranes west at Silverwood Lagoon on the 8th - a much sought after species for Sheffield listers!

On the 13th a single female type Common Scoter was at Rother Valley CP, with two at Thrybergh the following day remaining until the month end. A further two were at Rother Valley on the 16th.

Pink-footed Geese were on the move on the 17th with skeins of 120 over Ringinglow and Totley and with 76 over Kiveton. Another two adult Whoopers were at Redmires the same day.

The 20th saw Whooper Swans reported southeast over Norwood Allotments (33), with 16 down at Rother Valley.

The first **Waxwing**, of what will hopefully be a bumper winter, was reported at Rivelin Rocks on the 24th.

Yellow-browed Warbler Owlthorpe was an excellent find by Pete Brown on 25th, though due to driving there it sadly couldn't be added to his "Free Bird" list. Also on the 25th a Great Grey Shrike was at Big Moor.

On the 28th a single Whooper Swan flew west at Orgreave and two Waxwings and a **Snow Bunting** were at Broomhead, the latter remaining until the month's end. A fine looking Siberian (tristis) Chiffchaff was found at Lyons Street, Pitsmoor the same day.

A Knot paid a brief visit to Orgreave on the 29th and 18 Common Crossbill were at Redmires.

At Orgreave eight female type Common Scoter were present during the morning of the 30th and two (increasing to three the following day) Twite were among the mobile Linnet flock.

Committee Matters

In addition to planning indoor meetings, field trips, the Group's website and the annual report, one of the standing items at committee meetings is local conservation matters. In October, David Wood made a submission on behalf of SBSG to provide evidence to the parliamentary select committee on driven grouse shooting. The Group's submission can be read in full at:

Unfortunately, the presentation and hearing of evidence was decidedly unscientific, with the case for the Association the Moorland and Countryside Alliance resting on unsubstantiated statements around the (financial and conservation) benefits of grouse shooting that went essentially unquestioned the members of the Committee committee. member Simon Hart is ex-CEO of the Countryside Alliance and has listed on the parliament's Register of Interests that his secretary/ research assistant (his wife) is an administrative assistant for the Countryside Alliance. Should we be surprised that those challenging the vested interests of grouse shooting came in for far more rigorous questioning than those who continue to advocate it?

Poolsbrook CP/ Poolsbrook Marsh

Meet at 1pm in the car park OPPOSITE the visitors centre / cafe:

Nestled in the outskirts Chesterfield, the Poolsbrook area has a remarkable diversity of species which regularly feature in the SBSG and DOS annual reports. The primary focus will be the small lake at Poolsbrook Country Park - this traditionally provides an area for gulls to congregate and 'wash off' after using the adjacent refuse tips, before they head off to roost at Ogston Reservoir, just outside area. Amongst the regular species such as Black-headed, Common, Herring, Lesser and Great Blackbacked Gulls, there is always a chance of picking out more unusual species such as Yellow-legged, Glaucous and Iceland Caspian, Gulls. If time permits, a circuit of nearby Poolsbrook Marsh should also be productive, with Water Rail, Willow Tit and wintering Chiffchaff often recorded from the reedbed / willow scrub, plus the possibility of Cetti's Warbler. which has wintered occasionally in recent years.
